

Why Take Part in AMSR?

Suicidal behavior is a major cause of death and disability in U.S.

Over 44,000 people die by suicide each year in the U.S. --- And for every suicide death, there are an additional 25 suicide attempts.

A significant proportion of people who die by suicide have had recent contact with a behavioral health professional prior to their death.

AMSR will prepare professionals to assess, treat, and manage their patients and clients struggling with suicidality.

AMSR provides workforce development in suicide prevention:

AMSR teaches core suicide prevention competencies which meet the needs of various behavioral health professionals. These professionals include psychiatrist and psychologists, counselors, social workers, therapists, ATOD professionals, and professionals working with youth (10-24) in the juvenile justice or foster care systems, and other settings.

Workshop Objectives:

Participants will learn the following core competencies:

- Managing reactions to suicidality in clients
- Reconciling the difference between a clinician's goal to prevent suicide and a client's goal to eliminate pain
- Maintaining a collaborative stance
- Eliciting suicide ideation, behavior, and plans
- Judging a client's suicidal risk
- Developing safety plans
- Developing a written treatment plan for suicide ideation
- Developing policies and procedures for monitoring clients
- Implementing the principles of crisis management

AMSR Trainer:

Josephine Ridley, Ph.D., is a clinical psychologist and manages a partial hospitalization program for the seriously mentally ill at the Louis Stokes Cleveland VA Medical Center. She is an adjunct Associate Professor of Psychology at Case Western Reserve University, works in private practice with adolescents, adults and geriatric clients, and has conducted workshops for numerous organizations.

She has served on the OSPF Advisory Committee since 2005, and on the workgroup tasked with facilitating the implementation of Ohio House Bill 28's Institutions of Higher Education suicide prevention efforts.

She is published in the areas of anxiety and depression, co-authored a book chapter on suicide and mood disorders, and is conducting research on depression and suicide. She has provided the AMSR Workshop for multiple naval bases, community hospitals, and mental health centers across the country.

Josephine Ridley, Ph.D., is certified by the Suicide Prevention Resource Center as a Master Trainer of Trainers in the AMSR workshop.
